HERITAGE ANALYSIS

SITE & STRUCTURE DESCRIPTION:	"Building with slate roof with dentilled eaves and projecting gables with straight sides, half-round caps and round louvred vents with plaster surrounds; rusticated corner pilasters. Building was rubbed brickwork, now painted; stone plinth. Woodwork all varnished: 6x6 sashes with louvred shutters, 3x3 doors with 8-pane fanlights. Fine cast iron fence and gates with cast iron posts."
HISTORY:	An 18th Century house was demolished when this building was constructed. The land on which it stands probably already belonged to Marthinus Beyleveld in 1785 when he was granted the adjacent Rhenish complex land. In 1793 the site was acquired by PA Myburgh. The house later belonged to Rev JC Kronlein.
