HERITAGE ANALYSIS

SITE & STRUCTURE DESCRIPTION:	This linear werf follows a road along the Krom River. The long cellar, with doubled-up end gables, dates from c1830 and would once have formed both house and cellar. The front stoep is raised and edged with mature oak trees. The Edwardian house is rectangular in plan and has Victorian elements, under stoep to three sides. It appears that some original joinery remains. The entire complex has been refurbished - the paint colours and similar modifications are somewhat inappropriate, but the landscaping contributes to the werf.
HISTORY:	The land was subdivided off from "Groote & Klein Yda's Vlei and Nazareth". The Surveyor General diagram of 1826 is very interesting - it shows the homestead, labelled "Glen Bon", as well as the cemetery. Additionally, it indicates groves of poplar trees all along the course of the Krom River at this location, indicating that the wooded character of the site has been a long-standing feature. The farm was owned by Sir Thomas Smartt in the early 20th century.
