HERITAGE ANALYSIS

SITE & STRUCTURE DESCRIPTION:	This is a single-storey house under pitched roof with a somewhat crude Cape Revival-style bay and end gable and a raised stoep across the front facade supported on columns. The house is unfortunately vacant and in a state of disrepair, although it remains retrievable. It has similarities to the Cape Revival-style houses further up Webersvallei Road.
HISTORY:	The settlement dates back to 1903 when Rhenish Mission settlers made Stellenbosch their home, and established Jamestown on the outskirts of the town in order for members of their congregation, many of whom were farm labourers, small scale subsistence farm
