ARCHITECTURAL STYLE

Cape Dutch, much altered PHS.

ARCHITECT/BUILDER

SITE DESCRIPTION

H-plan house on linear werf with other outbuildings; altered significantly by Watermeyer in 1877 and again more recently. Character of buildings changed with dormer windows, gable, Victorian garden features and Victorian-Baroque walling. Old well house, photographed by Elliot, still remains.

STATEMENT OF SIGNIFICANCE

Although this site has been somewhat degraded through alteration, the werf wall and well structure are very significant features in the context of the winelands. The site as a whole still retains historical, architectural, contextual and scenic significance.

INTERIOR DESCRIPTION

GROUPING WITH OTHER SITES

Main H-shaped house with long buildings are found in a row. The old wine cellar is the only building not found in that line.

Office building (added structure) and random use of the werf as parking lot. Degraded and fragmented werf. Not one coherent grouping but rather a few individual part each with its own fence is seen. Large trees and a few forgotten steps in the landscape
