ARCHITECT/BUILDER

SITE DESCRIPTION

Late Cape Dutch T-shape, gable 1834, single storey pitched thatch roof with front and end gable. Attached is Baker-designed (1908) double-story Cape Revival with protruding gable end, and bay-window.

STATEMENT OF SIGNIFICANCE

This is a historically layered site, with an original Cape Dutch homestead dating from the early decades of the 1800s, added to by Baker. Significance spans considerations of aesthetics, architecture and landscape, as well as associational individuals such as Pickstone and Baker.
