ARCHITECT/BUILDER

SITE DESCRIPTION

A typical, single-storey and double-pitched vernacular cottage (with roof loft), and lean-to addition at the back and front. The front lean-to comprises an open stoep with rusticated columns. The cottage faces the street edge, but is set back from it. There is a modern house behind.

STATEMENT OF SIGNIFICANCE

These structures are representative of the modest, vernacular cottage type that characterises historic Raithby. They have historical and contextual significance. They have a strong association with the history of slavery in the winelands.

SITE HISTORY

Originally a missionary community for emancipated slaves established by Barnabas Shaw following the abolition of slavery at the Cape in 1834. The original lots were rented out to 800 freed slaves.

The honeysuckle hedge along the street edge contributes to the spatial quality of the street.
