ARCHITECT/BUILDER

SITE DESCRIPTION

This is a single-storey house under pitched roof with a Cape Revival bay and a raised stoep across the front facade supported on columns. The house has unfortunately been insensitively extended with a modern garage, and changes to the stoep, although it remains retrievable. It has similarities to the house adjacent to the church, further up Webersvallei Road.

STATEMENT OF SIGNIFICANCE

These structures are representative of the modest, vernacular cottage type that characterises historic Jamestown. They have historical and contextual significance. They have a strong association with the history of slavery in the winelands.
